



Isn't it mysterious? Genesis 18:1 tells us that "the Lord appeared to Abraham." But then, Abraham sees "three men". The visitors are later identified as angels, but one seems to be the Lord himself. It's hard to know exactly what Abraham saw and at what point he realized that he was in the presence of almighty God.

Here's another mystery: this same Lord will be with everyone gathered at every Mass today. We will hear his voice in the readings and see him in the unlikely appearance of bread and wine. So let's take a look at how Abraham responded to God's presence to see how we can respond today.

First, Abraham gave God his *full attention*. He stopped what he was doing and "ran" to meet God. As Mass begins, you can imitate Abraham as you try to put aside distractions and be attentive to the Lord.

Next, he *bowed down*. While this might have been a traditional greeting, it also showed that Abraham recognized his visitors' dignity. Imagine yourself bowing low as you pray the Gloria and praise God in the responsorial psalm.

Then, Abraham offered to God *the best he had* - fine flour and a choice steer. When the gifts are brought to the altar, you can offer your life to the Lord. Give him your love and fidelity.

Finally, Abraham *waited on his guests*. That's something you can do after Holy Communion, as you pray quietly in adoration. Enjoy your time with the Lord and listen to him.

So when you come to Mass, remember Abraham. Let the mysterious, surprising presence of God fill you with reverence and generosity. Offer him your attention, your worship, the best of who you are. As you do, you'll come to see him more and more clearly. Just like Abraham. *wau.com* 

Abraham is a model of prayer because he walked in the presence of God, heard and obeyed him. His prayer was a battle of faith because he continued to believe in the fidelity of God even in times of trial. Besides, after having received in his own rent the visit of the Lord who confided his plan to him, Abraham dared to intercede for sinners with bold confidence.

# POPE FRANCIS CALLS "HOLY YEAR OF HOPE" 2025

Pope Francis has announced that hope will be the central theme for the 2025 Jubilee Year, voicing his desire for the year to foster a greater sense of global brotherhood and solidarity with the poor, as well as care for the environment.

After two years marked by the coronavirus pandemic and the crisis left in its wake, "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision," the pope said.

The coming Jubilee "can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire," he said. "That is why I have chosen as the motto of the Jubilee, 'Pilgrims of Hope.'"

The first-ever "Holy Year" was instituted by Pope Boniface VIII in 1300 and was initially celebrated every 100 years. Then, following biblical tradition, it was marked every 50 years, and it was finally decided by Pope Paul II in 1490 to observe the jubilee year every 25 years, so that each person could experience one in his or her lifetime.

Jubilees, designed to be a time of conversion and increased emphasis on God's mercy and forgiveness of sins, are marked by the opening of the Holy Door in St. Peter's Basilica. The Holy Doors, present in each of the four papal basilicas in Rome, are destination points for pilgrims who travel to Rome during the Jubilee and who pass through seeking special graces and outpourings of God's mercy.

The last Ordinary Jubilee was the Great Jubilee of 2000, celebrated by Pope Saint John Paul II.

A new custom of calling "extraordinary" jubilees, meaning outside of the 25-year rotation, and which can last a few days to a few months, began in the 16th century. There have only been a handful of extraordinary jubilees since, the latest being the 2015-2016 Jubilee of Mercy called by Pope Francis.

The Holy Year of 2025 will be the 27th ordinary jubilee year of the Catholic Church.

"As the first twenty-five years of the new century draw to a close, we are called to enter into a season of preparation that can enable the Christian people to experience the Holy Year in all its pastoral richness," Pope Francis said.

Pope Francis said a Bull of Indiction outlining the guidelines for the celebration of the Jubilee of 2025 will be issued "in due course." Apostles of Mary Autumn 2022

Our Lord told us to make disciples (Mt 28:16–20). Through Jesus Christ, God's love invites all people to share in a life of joy and mercy. To serve Christ is to find freedom and love as a disciple. Through Baptism, this task belongs to all of us, whatever our personal calling. Each agency, organisation and ministry of the local Church is a means of sharing in the work of making disciples through a witness to truth, mercy and love.

It is not a task for a privileged few, but for all of us. To serve the Lord faithfully, we must be prepared and taught, humbly learning the craft of sharing the Good News. In other words, to *share the Gospel*, we must be well formed. All of us are being formed in some way, whether we are aware of it or not. The ideas and beliefs that shape us over time make us witnesses to those values.

Allowing the world to uncritically form us is contrary to the Gospel. To be formed in the school of Christ, we first receive the gift of faith in all its freedom, fan its flame within us and courageously share it. Such a task will require humility and patience, and a share in Christ's cross.

Baptism is the point of entry and provides the model for the path of formation as missionary disciples (Francis, general audience, 15 January 2014; St John Paul II, Angelus address, 9 January 2005). Baptism is not merely a 'once and for all', event, but a rich source of grace throughout one's life, providing for ongoing replenishment, because together we are a people on a 'journey' (*Lumen Gentium*, n6). All formation, therefore, is a pilgrimage that can only be made fruitfully and fearlessly by being close to Jesus Christ (*Evangelii Gaudium*, n23). From this dynamic of repentance, conversion and mission, the life of discipleship emerges and flourishes.

Formation for discipleship in Christ is both a right of the baptised as it is a responsibility of the Church. Finding new paths of catechesis and witness attuned to the needs of the time is urgent and fundamental to our mission. To find new paths and be able to speak the word of Christ fruitfully, a consistent and clear vision of what our mission is will guide every formative experience.

While we all need formation in Christ, those who aspire to leadership will be committed to his mission with a creativity and sensitivity, always 'led by the Holy Spirit' (*Gaudium et Spes*, n43).

As Jesus promised, out of good treasure in the heart, good will grow, and we will be known by our fruits (Lk 6:43–45). *Nigel Zimmermann Melbourne Catholic*
