Veneration and Mass celebrated by Archbishop Comensoli Saturday 30 September 11am St Margaret Mary's Church 51 Mitchell St Brunswick North. Peter, James, and John must have wondered why Jesus called them aside and led them up that mountain. Did he have an important teaching to give them? An exciting mission? A special blessing? Jesus gave them all of this - and so much more. At his transfiguration, he offered these three eyewitnesses a revelation of who he is: the Son of God. He gave them a glimpse of his glory.

We can hardly fault them for their stunned silence. Only Peter could find words to respond to Jesus' glorious appearance - and his desire to build tents for Jesus, Moses, and Elijah only demonstrated just how little he understood! Peter was just beginning to see that Jesus was no ordinary teacher. He was beginning to see that Jesus was the Lord, the God of Moses and Elijah, the God of the Law and the Prophets. And what he saw filled his heart with joy. So he said, "Lord, it is good that we are here".

It is good to be with the Lord! It's what we were created for. Whether we realize it or not, our hearts long for God and an awareness of his presence. He is our greatest good! And Jesus longs to reveal that goodness to us even more than we long to know him. That's why he took on flesh and became a man. That's why he poured out his Holy Spirit. And that's why he is truly and fully present in the Eucharist at every Mass.

Today, Jesus wants to give you a glimpse of his glory. He wants to assure you that he is the Lord: alive, powerful, and close to you. Jesus invites you to lift your eyes and your heart toward heaven and ask the Spirit to give you spiritual eyes to see him. So as the priest holds up the Host and Precious Blood at Mass today, you can proclaim in faith with Peter., Lord it is good for us to be here.

WHY DO WE PRAY? III

There are many types of prayer, for instance, prayers of adoration, or forgiveness, or thanksgiving, or intercession.

We shall comment on just one of these, namely, prayer of intercession.

Some now suggest that we should never ask God for earthly blessings. However, the 'Our Father' teaches us to pray for our 'daily bread', that is, what we need for our daily needs. The petitions are the simple, confident, 'demands' of the child. Childlike in a good sense, but not childish. There is no promise that we shall receive this bread, much less caviar and champagne.

However, there is a danger here. Do we only pray well when we want something from God? Do we love God, or what we are asking for?

If most of our (sincere) prayers ask God for something, then we are childish, and we know what children get (or should get) when they spend most of their time asking. The parable of the ten lepers who were cured while only one returned to say thank you is important because it tells us something about human nature, about ourselves.

Another type of prayer which should be encouraged is meditation, especially on the Scriptures. Meditation means 'thinking about', and we all meditate. Who will win the football? What will the children do? Shall I buy a new hat?

Many attitudes and teachings of Christ are puzzling. (Why were the prostitutes closer to the kingdom of heaven than the Pharisees?) We should puzzle over these; perhaps discuss them among ourselves. Certainly we need to let them work on us, and slowly transform us.

This is one reason why the Word of God (the Scripture readings and explanation in the homily) are a vital part of the Mass.

Because of the busy pace of modern life, and the strains this pace imposes, quiet meditative prayer is more necessary now than ever before. We need to stop occasionally, even for our health. This is one more reason why Sunday is a day of rest.

Can we sit with ourselves and face the boredom? (One Eastern writer said that the majority of people are like a shaving of wood which is curled round its central emptiness.) Or do we always lurch for the TV or the radio? For our health, we need to sit quietly occasionally. Do we go a step further and turn to God in these moments of anguish?
