IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF MARY MCKILLOP

Australian pilgrimage 17-28 October 2023 national.pilgrimage@mmp.org.au Isn't it the way that things often happen? One minute, you're filled with good and holy thoughts. Then the next minute, someone says something that upsets you, and you respond with anger, jealousy, resentment, or some other negative emotion. We all know what that's like!

So it should be no surprise to see Peter "rebuke" Jesus, the man he had just proclaimed to be "the Messiah, the Son of the living God": When he hears Jesus predict his coming death, Peter becomes upset. In a flash, he loses his peace and clarity. Instead of humbly asking Jesus what he means, he tries to tell Jesus what he should and should not do. And that passionate response earns Peter a stern rebuke of his own: "Get behind me, Satan!"

So how can we get to the point where we can hold onto our peace and our trust in the Lord no matter what happens? The answer lies in today's second reading: "Be transformed by the renewal of your mind". We can change. We can learn how to put aside our fallen sinful thoughts and ideas and take on Jesus' way instead. Or as Jesus told Peter, we can learn to think "as God does".

For Peter, this meant accepting that the way of Jesus, the Messiah, is the way of self - giving love, not self preservation. For us, it may mean asking for the grace to embrace Jesus' call to forgive "seventy-seven times", or to turn the other cheek, or to choose not to be served "but to serve", or any of Jesus' other teachings that we find difficult.

Today's story about Peter shows us that this kind of change is not a once-and-done event. It happens over time, often with stops and starts. But it does happen, day after day, decision after decision. We *can* be transformed! wau.com

We have passions so that through strong emotions and distinct feelings we might be attracted to what is right and good and repelled from what is evil and bad. God made us in such a way that we can love and hate, desire or despise something, be attracted by some things and afraid of others, be full of joy, sorrow, or anger. OLD SCHOOL TEACHING PROVES TO BE A CATALYST FOR LEARNING

Seated in rows, the young students at St Vincent's Primary School are watching their teacher, all eyes on the prize of learning something new. "A verb is a doing and action word," the teacher says, and the entire class chimes in repetition before each child turns to repeat the words to a classmate. Every student writes a verb on a small whiteboard to show the teacher, who calls on them at random to describe a verb. "It does sound old school," says Monique Egan, acting principal of the Canberra Catholic school. "But there's no doubt it helps children focus. There's less opportunity for kids to hide and not engage. There are no long teacher explanations - students have to listen, and they're responding, thinking, doing, making, showing and writing. I've never seen the school do this well."

St Vincent's school has embraced a teaching method known as direct or explicit instruction, derided for decades as "drill and kill". It involves teaching children to read by phonics, sounding out words instead of memorising or guessing words from pictures. Homework is minimal but students are encouraged to read books at home and recite their times tables, the foundation of mathematics.

St Vincent's Primary School is part of the nation's biggest experiment in using explicit instruction to lift student results. It is one of 56 schools in the Catholic Education Archdiocese of Canberra-Goulburn, whose director Ross Fox has transformed teaching styles through a program called Catalyst.

Based on the scientific concept of cognitive load, lessons are delivered with clear instructions from the teacher and constant questioning of students to test their understanding. Concepts are repeated and practised, then reviewed regularly, to help children remember. Teaching materials are shown on smartboards, stripped of any distracting animations that stop kids concentrating.

Lessons are far from dull because teachers don't drone on at the front of the classroom but keep kids constantly involved. "There's so much repetition, but the skill of the teachers is to make that repetition enjoyable in an engaging lesson," Fox says. "There's a benefit to sitting in rows and facing the teacher because attention during that precious instructional time is so important. If you want a child to learn new knowledge, the most effective way is to tell them clearly and precisely what you want them to learn."

The improvements are eye-opening An Equity Economics analysis shows that in reading, 42 per cent of year 3 students in Catholic schools in Canberra-Goulburn were behind kids in similar schools across Australia in 2019. Last year, just three years after Catalyst transformed classrooms, only 4 per cent of year 3s were underperforming. Inspired by this success, Catholic schools in Tasmania and Melbourne also are adopting the Catalyst model.

PRIESTS RETIREMENT FOUNDATION

- In 1990 Archbishop Little established the Priests Retirement Foundation, "caring for those who cared"
- Priests are not employees of the Archbishop or the Parish so they are not eligible for superannuation.
