
Liturgy of the Word

Today we read how Jesus accused Jerusalem's religious leaders of laying "heavy burdens" on people by imposing more and more rules on them. But wasn't he doing the same thing? After all, he's the One who told people, "Take my yoke upon you". Isn't a yoke -a contraption made of iron and hardwood - a burden as well?

Maybe so, but anyone who spent time with Jesus saw that the burden he spoke about was completely different and much more attractive!

First, Jesus said that the burdens imposed by these scribes and Pharisees "nullified the word of God". They consisted of rules and fasts and tithes that were nowhere to be found in the Law of Moses. Some of them even contradicted God's will for his people. But Jesus' voke is meant to help us "fulfil" the word of God. It's a voke that calls us simply to love him and love our neighbour.

Jesus also said that his opponents placed burdens on people but did not "lift a finger" to help them. By contrast. Jesus used the image of a yoke to describe his "burden." A yoke is an instrument that links two oxen together so they can help each other bear the load. And that's the point: Jesus wants to yoke himself to us so that he can walk beside us and help to lighten our burden.

Finally, and most important, the burdens of Jesus' opponents were made up of human regulations and restrictions, of additional fasts and tithes, that could not bring people closer to God. But the exact opposite happens when we accept Jesus' yoke. We come into an ever-deepening relationship with him. And that relationship fills us with the joy and comfort of his own Spirit.

So come to Jesus today. Let him yoke himself to you in a bond of everlasting love.

Home visitation is one of the most important aspects of the St Vincent de Paul Society's identity.

The work of home visitation is often referred to as the core work of the Society. It is the original work of the Society, and throughout the history of the Society, it has been the standard work of conferences across the world.

Last year in Victoria over 92,000 home visits were made by members of the 245 conferences across the state, Some people drift through their entire life. They do it one Vinnies cards, education expenses, utility bills, furniture. and other cost of living expenses.

When a person needs assistance, they ring the 1800 number for the Society. The person needing assistance (sometimes referred to by Society members as a "Companion") then provides their details to the person taking the call - their name, address, family situation, type of assistance, etc.

The visitation request is then forwarded that afternoon to Be hopeful the parish conference nearest to that person, for them to be visited within the next day or so. The local parish conference will normally have a pair of volunteer members rostered on for that day. Before making the visit, these two members call ahead to ensure the Companion will be home when the members turn up for the visit.
