The two Gospel readings today can give us emotional whiplash. As Mass begins, we hear the story of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. We may even wave our own palm branches and join the crowd in shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!". Then, in the Liturgy of the Word, we hear Mark's passion account. Once again, we join our voices with the crowd - but this time, we cry out, "Crucify him!". How jarring!

Why does the Church have us play a role in both of these readings as we begin Holy Week?

It's all for one purpose: so that we can grasp more fully what Jesus did for the crowds back then - and for us. As we will see throughout Holy Week, he accepted the suffering set before him and freely offered himself for his people, regardless of how they responded. Whether they acclaimed or condemned him, he loved them just the same. And that's how he loves us.

Jesus is not put off by our fickleness. That's good news! Because if we're honest, we can all recognize times when our own commitment to the Lord and our love for him has wavered. When life is going well, it's not so hard to praise him. But it can be another story altogether when danger threatens or sadness darkens our outlook.

So allow these passages to motivate you to pay attention to this final week in Christ's life. Acknowledge the inconstancy of your own love for Jesus and ask him to strengthen you. But don't stop there! Open your heart to the liberating truth that Jesus loves you even when you stray. Look at the cross and believe that he held you close to his heart throughout his passion, death, and resurrection.

May the Lord pour out graces on us all during this most holy week of the year! wau.org



At the established time Jesus chose to go up to Jerusalem to suffer his passion and death, and to rise from the dead. As the Messiah King who shows forth the coming of the Kingdom, he entered into his city mounted on a donkey. He was acclaimed by the little children whose shout of joyful praise is taken up in the Sanctus of the Eucharistic liturgy: "Blessed is He Who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna (save us!)" (Mt 21:9). The liturgy of the Church opens Holy Week by celebrating this entry into Jerusalem.

Next weekend Easter Sunday Acts 10: 34, 37-43 Colossians 3: 1-4 Mark 16: 1-7



Narrator: The Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Mark

First thing in the morning, the chief priests, together with the elders and scribes, in short the whole Sanhedrin,

had their plan ready. They had Jesus bound and took him away and handed him over to Pilate.

Pilate questioned him,

Reader: Are you the king of the Jews?

**Narrator:** He answered,

**Priest:** 'It is you who say it'.

**Narrator:** And the chief priests brought many accusations against him. Pilate questioned him again,

**Reader**: Have you no reply at all? See how many accusations they are bringing against you?

**Narrator:** But to Pilate's amazement, Jesus made no further reply.

At festival time, Pilate used to release a prisoner for them, anyone they asked for. Now a man called Barabbas was then in prison with the rioters who had committed murder during the uprising. When the crowd went up

and began to ask Pilate the customary favour, Pilate answered them,

**Reader:** Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?

**Narrator:** For he realised it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed Jesus over. The chief priests, however,

had incited the crowd to demand that he should release Barabbas for them instead. Then Pilate spoke again.

**Reader:** But in that case, what am I to do with the man you call king of the Jews?

Narrator: They shouted back.

ALL: CRUCIFY HIM!

Narrator: Pilate asked them,

**Reader:** Why? What harm has he done? Narrator: But they shouted all the louder,

ALL: CRUCIFY HIM!

Narrator: So Pilate, anxious to placate the crowd, released Barabbas for them and, having ordered Jesus to be scourged,

handed him over to be crucified.

The soldiers led him away to the inner part of the palace, that is, the Praetorium, and called the whole cohort together. They dressed him up in purple, twisted some thorns into a crown and put it on him. And they began

saluting him.

Reader: Hail, king of the Jews!

**Narrator:** They struck his head with a reed and spat on him; and they went down on their knees to do him homage. And when they had finished making fun of him, they took off the purple and dressed him in his own clothes.

They led him out to crucify him. They enlisted a passer-by, Simon of Cyrene, father of Alexander and Rufus, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross. They brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha, which means the place of the skull. They offered him wine mixed with myrrh, but he refused it. Then they crucified him, and shared out his clothing, casting lots to decide what each should get. It was the third hour when they crucified him. The inscription giving the charge against him read: 'The King of the Jews'. And they crucified two robbers with him, one on his right and one on his left. The passers-by jeered at him; they

shook their heads and said,

Reader: Aha, so you would destroy the Temple and rebuild it in three days! then save yourself: come

down from the cross!

Narrator: The chief priests and scribes mocked him among themselves in the same way. They said,

Reader: He saved others, he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the king of Israel, come down from the

cross now, for us to see it and believe.

**Narrator:** Even those who were crucified with him taunted him. When the sixth hour came, there was darkness over the

whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour, Jesus cried out in a loud voice.

**Priest:** Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?

**Narrator:** This means, 'My God, my God, why have you deserted me?'

When some of those who stood by heard this, they said,

Reader: Listen, he is calling on Elijah.

**Narrator:** Someone ran and soaked a sponge in vinegar and, putting it on a reed, gave it to him to drink, saying:

**Reader:** Wait and see if Elijah will come to take him down.

**Narrator:** But Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. *All kneel and pause for silent reflection and prayer* 

And the veil of the Temple was torn in two from top to bottom.

The centurion, who was standing in front of him, had seen how he had died, and he said,

Reader: In truth, this was a Son of God.

Narrator: The Gospel of the Lord. ALL: PRAISE TO YOU, LORD JESUS CHRIST.
